PASTOR'S REPORT

Dear LNPC,

In September we started a year-long series on Grace – God's own being, shared with us, aka, the abundance of God's Yes to us. Our worship team retreated during the summer to brainstorm how to experience this more deeply, and it's been a great focus to shape our worship and life together this year. It's through this lens that I want to reflect on 2018, and some of the countless ways I experienced God's grace in our life together.



Supporting Katie and Shannon in their internships – specifically supervising Katie (Lisa supervised Shannon) was a joy. I loved watching her learn and grow through her time with us. She greatly impacted our young people, strengthening both their faith and their relationship with the adults in our congregation. And we sent them all to camp together! Magical. Last summer we welcomed Katie into membership, and sent her off to seminary. Being part of others' journey is such a gift, and being impacted by God through others is an extraordinary thing.

This year we held Prayer for the Nation every Friday – if I couldn't do it, Lisa or Sue led, and Dennis led for three months while I was away on Sabbatical. Norm is an anchor in these times. We hold that space of prayer on behalf of the larger whole – our community and our country. This is a meaningful touchstone for others on Facebook who are grateful for our regular practice. And did you know that the format we designed was published as a Lenten practice, and used by many churches in the US and even internationally this past Lent? Grace contagious!

I experienced grace when I got to spread the life of LNPC beyond us. A highlight was speaking in Ely at a presbytery event, helping other congregations reflect on what their gifts and calling are, instead of focusing on fear or scarcity. Another was doing spiritual direction and leading workshops at the National Youth Worker's Convention. Every year I support tired youth pastors and church leaders, and lead workshops that encourage them to try Sabbath, journaling, and new ways of praying. Our life together – specifically, your vulnerability and shared faith, empowerment of children, creativity in worship, and learning and seeking to practice Sabbath – are a blessing far beyond this community.

I've loved that we've begun chanting Psalms, connecting ourselves to this way of praying Scripture practiced by Christians for centuries. I loved the retreat and all the fun we had at Clearwater Forest. I love the glass mosaic window we're working on, and watching it come to life through the creativity and activity of many hands (big and small!). I loved the ways the kids have led and continue to redefine their roles with us as they grow and change.

I love working with Lisa and with Erin, and the gorgeous way our gifts mingle and strengthen each other's. I'm grateful for Krysta and Brittany, and their consistent and trustworthy sustaining of our administration and finances. I'm thankful for Lisa's joyful and steady leadership during sabbatical, and for her own discernment about her call and faithfulness to respond, moving at the end of 2018 from

Associate Pastor, to Parish Associate. There is such grace in honesty and openness with each other, and living into joy and calling together.

This year had growing pains and challenges with kids that you've weathered so well. We temporarily had a children's teacher in Lizabeth Bougie who led our kids through sabbatical time, while shaping a teaching model she can share with other congregations. But we've struggled with how to meet the needs of our changing group – now we've got more older kids and younger kids, with just a small handful in the middle (as was reflected on Christmas eve!), and no interns or other adult leadership. But instead of wallowing in scarcity, we turned to our abundance, and did several intergenerational Sunday school experiences at the end of the year – learning, praying and playing together. We decorated the sanctuary for Advent, baked cookies, and began the New Year creating a memorable Epiphany play. The kids learn so much alongside adults, and adults remember deep truths from learning alongside them. We are a gift to each other. We will continue our way through this a week at a time, and with great rejoicing we welcome Katie back as our Youth Leader starting in February!

Parents' et al Nights Out were a blast – both for the adults gathering for games or meals, and for the little ones building relationships and trust with our older kids and adults. Again, a gift to each other! Coffee and Donuts and PW were filled with good conversation and plenty of laughter. While we've enjoyed our times together, I loved watching the gratitude and grace with which Barb, Georgia and Rosie decided it was time to retire PW. Embracing life in the changing seasons, the welcoming and the releasing, are ways of living in grace.

Some years ago we said aloud that we wanted to take less money out of Endowment/savings each year, and we have. The trajectory since 2010 is: \$40,000, \$40,000, \$30,000, \$30,000, \$10,000, \$10,000, \$8,000, \$6,000, and for 2018: \$4,000. We are now taking out less every year, and by our practice of tithing has made generosity, and blessing other expressions of God's ministry in our community, central to our own mission and calling. The economics of it are illogical and challenging - but we keep remembering on purpose that this is not our church, it is God's, and we are called to be faithful stewards of the ministry God is doing in and through us (just like those who gave to the future of the congregation were years ago). We believe "money follows mission" and not the other way around, and it was powerful hearing the impact our sharing has beyond our community from some of our partners. We continue to seek to be obedient to God's direction, and God continues to sustain us. We exist only by God's grace, and all that we do is for the purpose of sharing in and spreading that grace.

At the beginning of 2018 session went through an intensive discernment process to seek God's direction about our tithing practice. We came out clear that two courses were equally needed - both continued tithing with expanding relationships, and pursuing a capital campaign to care for the building and plan intentionally for the future of our congregation. After talking with two architects and a financial consultant, the questions have evolved and broadened as we've taken a step back to some big picture work. We are now asking, What is our purpose as a congregation in the coming decade? Who are we meant to be and how are we called to minister in a changing church and world? How are we called to collaborate with other congregations? What is the best use of our space? How can we most faithfully use our resources (building, people, money, gifts and talents, etc.) to serve God and the world?

We're in an exciting (and sometimes unnerving!) place of seeking direction for the future, and you've got a grounded and strong session at the helm. In fact, it feels like as a congregation, we are in a very healthy place as we stand on the threshold of our 100th anniversary (in three years!), with new questions and the task of "futuring" for a church - and a Church - that is so radically changing. 2019 will be significant, as we continue exploring what it means to live into our future.

My own sabbatical experience was a life highlight. Truly. It feels like it poured concrete into the foundation of our family. We got to live into the transition from childhood to adolescence with very intensive, sustained time together (and all the joy and discomfort that comes with that!) And the sabbatical gave me space to pay attention to the world in ways I long to – to take in experiences and process them, to simplify and be present to the amazing things right in front of me. The challenges of travel in other cultures heightened my awareness of the gift of living, and of God's pervasive presence in the world. I found deep rest – not the kind you get from getting more sleep, the kind you get from unclenching your mind. The time I spent at the monastery in silence was profoundly rich and impactful. And it was a joy to return from sabbatical to a congregation that feels healthy, connected and vibrant, even in the midst of transition and questions. I loved hearing stories of your own heart-singing sabbatical time, and hearing words and sentences come from small people who couldn't talk when I left, or watching them walk and run when I'd last seen them crawl! What a gift it all is, and also the grant that helped make all these experiences possible! (Grace!)

I enter into 2019 with a shifting sense of call, both in our community and in myself. I am paying attention to the Holy Spirit's leading, and discerning how to best support the session as they do the good work of guiding our congregation into a new chapter, because it is abundantly clear to me we are entering a new chapter. What will that mean for us? I'm excited to find out. The congregation has recognized part of my role in our life together is (has always been) in an outreach capacity – speaking, writing and sharing the things we learn together for the benefit of the wider Church and beyond. It's clear that in 2019 writing will be a more important part of that work for me. I am now getting outside support to structure what I have written into a book and seek publication. As the New Year begins, I have also begun the final sabbatical grant commitment – having coffee with each person. I love this so much, and I am really looking forward to connecting with every one of you as the year continues.

We are held in God's grace, and we experience this in infinite big and small ways. Some years we've known God's grace most powerfully through pain and loss; Jesus met us as we were with and for each other. This year, it was most powerfully through play and rest. Jesus met us as we were with and for each other. It's all grace; it's all a vehicle to be pulled deeper into God's love. Belovedness is every person's most fundamental true identity, and love is every person's true purpose. Remembering that for ourselves, for each other, and for the whole world, is our sacred calling. We call the resonance that comes in those moments when we are aligned with this true identity and purpose, *joy*. What greater task is there for humans in life than this?

I'm so blessed to be sharing it with you.

I have been serving on sessions and other church bodies since 1973 or 1974 and within a decade we had seen a radical drop in membership with accompanying loss of revenue which became an existential concern for this parish. LNPC began a slow decline where the prospect of shuttering the building became more possible with each passing year. This was due to several factors: politics both local and national, an aging congregation but most important, in my opinion, a transition of parish membership (all over the country!) to a much more transient and fluid population. I raised the question aloud at Presbytery whether we might see the traditional parish

ministries (at least urban ones) need to morph into more of a chaplaincy type ministry.

In 2019 I no longer feel this way.

2018 was the year that "closing the doors" was no longer the elephant in the room at session meetings. It does not mean that we no longer have significant financial challenges but disaster doesn't seem quite so imminent in the long run. We have had help from grants and we have made (I think) productive use of spaces in the building that otherwise would have lain dormant, in the past, few years. This includes but is not limited to compensated use by outside, community groups and other congregations.

Our own "demographic" has improved in at least two ways: We have enrolled some new members who in turn have become active in the life of the church. Last year's babies and toddlers are now schoolchildren and last year's schoolchildren have become today's youth. This is very exciting to me! It oozes potential if invested well.

Finally, I sense that what has gone right has done so because we, as a congregation, have genuinely tried to silence ourselves at the critical moments and listen for God's counsel. We are serious about discernment and it is in those moments that I have felt the presence of the Spirit. One thing I have learned about prayer is that it doesn't have to be a formal, stiff, liturgical "drill and ceremony". You can pray by the act of discernment; you can pray by the act of journeying, you can pray by enjoying the moment. My prayer is that we can keep up that particular, good work.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN REPORT

Sometimes things change whether we like it or not. This past spring the decision was made to discontinue PW. In the last couple of years several of our most elderly members were forced to drop out for various reasons. That left us with three regulars which really isn't enough.







Many or most of the younger women of the church are working so can't attend. Years ago not so many women worked outside the home and we had a really large PW group. The annual Bazaar was a really big money maker for the church but now we haven't had one for three years.

We three remaining members and Kara decided to disband and the money we had in our banking accounts in the amount of \$1294.65 we gave to the church and specified it be used for the new roof. Hopefully someday a new group can be formed.

- Sunday school program struggling to figure it out.



TREASURER'S SUMMARY AND FISCAL YEAR REPORT

The big news in the treasuring world is... we have a new Treasurer! Brittany Dexter agreed, in August, to assume the role of Treasurer, and was duly voted to do that work by Session. Yippee!!

With the able bookkeeping of Krysta, the transition has been pretty smooth, all in all. The breadth of the job is not captured in initial



We continue to encourage on-line giving, and that has become a larger portion of our receipts.

Sabbatical began as the Treasurer transitioned, but that was probably good, as it brought many pieces of our financial puzzle into the open. The receipt of the Lilly Grant/Congregational Support was essential to our ability to both 'let our hearts sing' and meet our financial obligations. Gratitude to the writers: Kara and Sue Hensel.

Highlights (which always begins with 'payments made fully and on time!'):

- Only \$4,000 was withdrawn from the Endowment Fund during the year. This is the least we have withdrawn since 2001! Only five times since 1986 that's 32 years ago! have we withdrawn less than this. WOW!! We have a balance of \$49,074 a/o January 9, 2019.
- \$10,000 for general use was again given to us by Westminster Presbyterian Minneapolis.
- The Lisa Larges Congregational Care Fund was opened in 2016, and it was tapped to cover \$5,150 of Lisa's compensation this year. Its balance is now \$710.
- We (will) distribut(ed) tithes of \$12,671.

A note for the year: the **2019 per capita** has been established: **\$35.70** per member on our rolls as of January 2018. We make a commitment, as a congregation, pay this completely, whether or not it is given by the membership. The General Fund covers whatever is not specifically contributed by members, so please attempt to contribute for each member in your family. Per Capita is the share each of us has in the functioning of our denomination – from staff to education to advocacy and our bi-annual Assemblies. It is helpful for all – congregation, presbytery, synod, and General Assembly – to have these funds submitted sooner rather than later. Thank you to those of you who have fulfilled this commitment for 2019 already.

To each member and friend: for prayer, for contributions of 'time, talents, & resources,' for courage, thank you.
